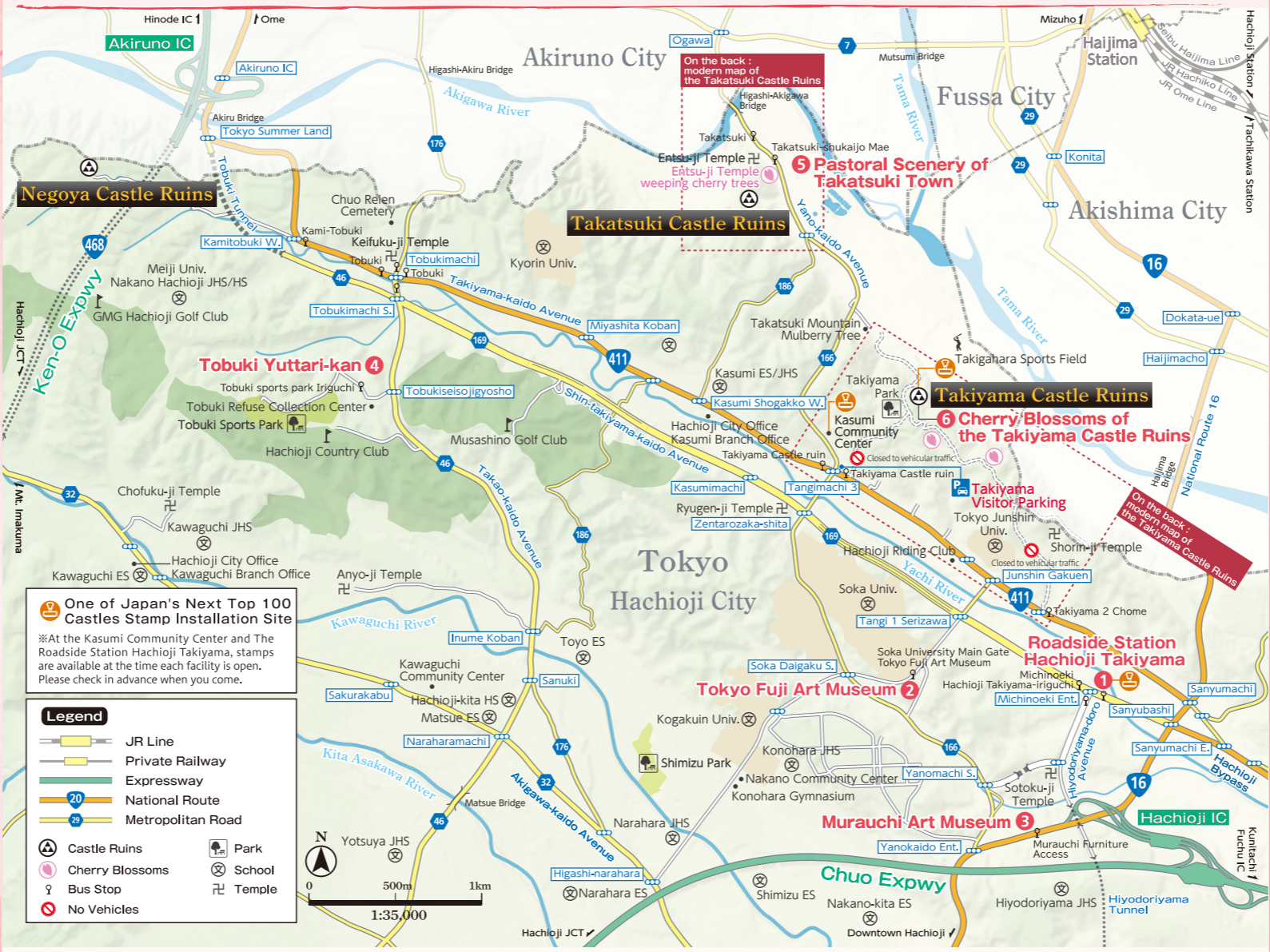
## TAKIYAMA-SANJO

### 「Takiyama-sanjo」

Spanning east to west up on Kasumi Hill overlooking the Tama and Aki rivers, one can find the remains of Takiyama Castle, Takatsuki Castle, and Negoya Castle. These three mountain castles of the Warring States Period are the pride of the Kasumi Region, and so are known as Takiyama-sanjo, or "The Three Castles of Takiyama".

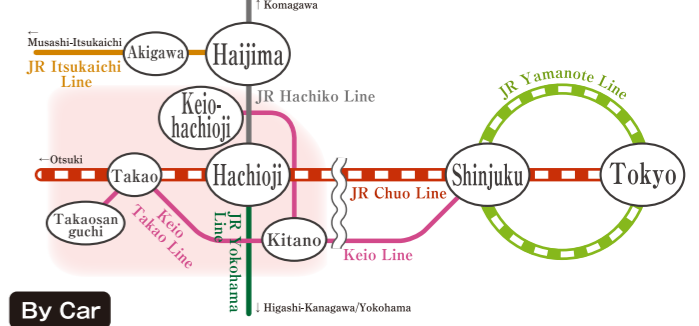
### Directions

#### By Public Transportation

**●Takiyama Castle Ruins**  
 From Keio-hachioji Station or the north exit of JR Hachioji Station, take the bus bound for Akigawa Station, Tokyo Summerland, Tobuki and Tobuki Sports Park Iriguchi. Ride for about 25 minutes and get off at Takiyama Castle Ruins bus stop. From there, it is a 1-minute walk away. From JR Haijima Station, take the bus bound for Tokyo Junshin University and Kogakuin University. Ride for about 20 minutes and get off at Takiyama Castle Ruins bus stop. From there, it is a 1-minute walk away.

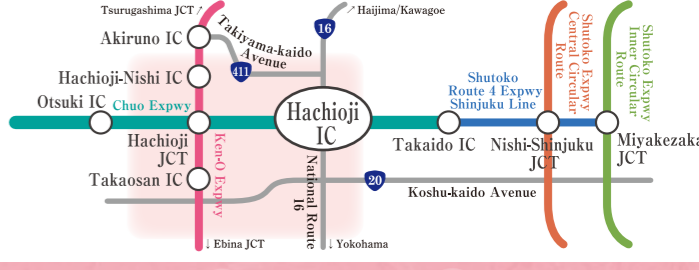
**●Takatsuki Castle Ruins**  
 From JR Haijima Station, take the bus bound for Tokyo Junshin University and Kogakuin University. Ride for about 10 minutes and get off at Takatsuki bus stop. From there, it is a 1-minute walk away.

**●Negoya Castle Ruins**  
 From Keio-hachioji Station or the north exit of JR Hachioji Station, take the bus bound for Tobuki and Tobuki Sports Park Iriguchi. Ride for about 30 minutes and get off at Tobuki bus stop. From there, it is a 25-minute walk away. Other buses stop near the ruins are the ones bound for Akigawa Station and Tokyo Summerland from Keio-hachioji Station or the north exit of JR Hachioji Station. Ride for about 30 minutes and get off at Kami-Tobuki bus stop. From there, it is a 20-minute walk away.



#### By Car

**●Takiyama Visitor Parking**  
 Address : 3-81, Tangi-machi, Hachioji-shi (the North-east corner of the Tangi 3 Chome intersection along Takiyama-kaido Avenue)  
 From the Chuo Expressway Hachioji IC, turn onto National Route 16 heading towards Haijima, and turn left at the Sanyumachi intersection onto National Route 411 (Takiyama-kaido Avenue).  
 Spots : 29 (including one accessible parking space)  
 Parking fee : None  
 Parking hours : 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.  
 \* Please note that the parking closes at 4:00 p.m. from November to February.  
 \* There is no parking spaces available near the Takatsuki Castle Ruins or the Negoya Castle Ruins. Please use public transportation.



### Tourist Attractions in Kasumi Area

- 1 Roadside Station Hachioji Takiyama**  
 This is the only roadside station in all of Tokyo. The rest stop provides limited edition sale of Takatsuki's local Takatsuki Seiryu Rice, as well as direct sale of fresh local vegetables and other agricultural products of Hachioji. Visitors can also order Hachioji Ramen and other dishes and desserts made with locally sourced ingredients.

- 2 Tokyo Fuji Art Museum**  
 Hosting roughly 30,000 works that span a wide variety of genres, the Tokyo Fuji Art Museum gives visitors a comprehensive look at how art has evolved over time in Japan, the East, and the West. Based on the motto of being "A museum creating bridges around the world", their exhibitions are well worth seeing.

- 3 Murauchi Art Museum**  
 Welcome to Japan's first ever museum to feature a collaboration between furniture and paintings. The museum has collected furniture crafted by world-famous designers, as well as masterpieces, innovative and major productions by modern French and Japanese painters. There is also a cafe and restaurant situated in the building, so feel free to relax and enjoy your time here.

- 4 Tobuki Yuttari-kan**  
 This public bathing facility makes use of the excess heat produced by the neighboring Tobuki Refuse Collection Center. Stop by to enjoy the weekly rotating baths and saunas, the adjoining restaurant offering healthy menu items, the Japanese-style banquet room complete with karaoke functionality, the massage room and more.

- 5 Pastoral Scenery of Takatsuki Town**  
 Blessed by both high quality and quantity of freeflowing water, Takatsuki boasts the largest pastures in all of the Tokyo metropolitan area. Feel free to take casual strolls around the area as you appreciate the beautiful pastoral scenery that changes with every season.

- 6 Cherry Blossoms of the Takiyama Castle Ruins**  
 The Takiyama Castle Ruins are known as one of the premier metropolitan locations for viewing cherry blossoms. When in full bloom in spring, the area reveals a masterpiece of floral scenery. During this time, the Takiyama Castle Ruins Cherry Blossom Festival is held in and around the Naka-no-maru plaza.
